

- Trouble with reading labels
- Dares
- Introduction to substance abuse



Poisoning Risk Factors

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
Teens/Young Adults



Oleander and Oleandrin: Not a Safe Plant or Supplement

Oleander is a large tropical bush or small tree with purple, pink, or white flowers. It may be used as an ornamental patio plant in Missouri gardens but grows naturally along highways in the Southern United States and in Hawaii. Although oleander is decorative and pretty, all parts of the plant, including the flowers, leaves, nectar and sap contain a dangerous poison.

Cleaners and Disinfectants



- Increase in disinfectant calls by 44% this year
- Cleaners and disinfectants have always been a common poison for poison centers
- We all have these products in our house/workplace
 - Frequent, regular use
 - Misuse and mishandling
 - Poor storage



What does it do?	Removes dirt and impurities from surface	Germ count is lowered	Germs are killed
Uses	Most surfaces	Household surfaces, food contact surfaces	Household surfaces, medical settings
Effective against	Can remove germs but not kill them	Some Bacteria	Bacteria, fungi, certain viruses




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Bleach Counts 2019 vs. 2020

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Use These Products Safely



- Open windows and ventilate
- Wear gloves, if possible
- Read and follow label directions and dilutions
- Do not use cleaning products on food or body surfaces



Signal Words



CAUTION	Slightly toxic either orally, dermally, or through inhalation; causes slight eye or skin irritation.
WARNING	Moderately toxic either orally, dermally, or through inhalation; causes moderate eye or skin irritation.
DANGER	Can cause severe eye damage or skin irritation.
DANGER- POISON	Highly toxic by any route of entry into the body.

Some Things Just Don't Mix



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DO NOT MIX THESE CLEANING PRODUCTS


BLEACH + VINEGAR

Bleach and vinegar mixture produces chlorine gas, which can cause coughing, breathing problems, burning and watery eyes.



BLEACH + AMMONIA

Bleach and ammonia produce a toxic gas called chloramine. It causes shortness of breath and chest pain.




BLEACH + RUBBING ALCOHOL

Bleach and rubbing alcohol makes chloroform, which is highly toxic.

HYDROGEN PEROXIDE + VINEGAR

This combination makes peracetic/peroxyacetic acid, which can be highly corrosive





Safe Storage



- Remember: there is no such thing as CHILD-PROOF
- Store all cleaning supplies and chemicals up and away and out of reach from children.
- Don't store cleaning or pesticide products near your food items.
- Do not transfer chemicals to unmarked containers or beverage bottles
 - all too often, this leads to somebody accidentally swallowing it.








- Increase in hand sanitizer calls by 75% with ages 0-5 years as biggest culprits
- High alcohol content
- Often hand sanitizer is not safely stored

Safe Storage and Use

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- Supervise children when using hand sanitizer
- Only use a dime-sized amount and rub in until dry
- Watch your eyes!
- Keep bottles up high and out of sight of children

Avoid having young children carry or keep small bottles on their

backpack or in their room







Medication



Medication: What's the Big Deal?





- Change in routine = Increased medicine mistakes
- More people are taking medicines
- Added stress and distraction
- Poor communication between parents/caregivers

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Safe Storage of Medication

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- Always keep medicine in a medication container, ideally the original container
- Keep medicine up, away and out of sight
- Medications for different family members should be kept separately
- If it needs to be stored in a fridge, make sure to keep it separate from food



Medicine and Kids

- Remember: there is no such thing as CHILD-PROOF
- Take your own medicine where children can't watch
- Don't call medicine candy
- Use the measuring devices that comes with the medicine
- Teach children to ask before touching or tasting anything that they find on their own

- More are using substances alone





